Dear Commander Dickman:

Thank you for your letter of March 21, 1974 regarding the proposed transfer of land at the Point Pinos Light Station in Pacific Grove, a property which is pending on the National Register of Historic Places. We are pleased to see you are aware of your responsibilities under Executive Order 11593, and appreciate being provided the opportunity to comment on the effects of the proposed land transfer.

Applying the criteria of effect for compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 and with Executive Order 11593, it would appear that the transfer of the property will have no effect upon the integrity of this historic site. The parcel proposed for transfer is already separated from the Light Station by a developed section of golf course land; as the parcel proposed for transfer is already isolated by development and as no substantial alteration of the transfer parcel would appear to be taking place, we feel that the transfer of the Coast Guard property to the U.S. Navy as shown on the map which accompanied your letter will be acceptable and will not affect historic values.

Thank you for providing us with the opportunity to comment upon this proposed transfer. Please do not hesitate to write if we may be of further assistance.
